Do You Have a Lawn Sprinkler System or Pool?

Kansas City, Missouri residents who own lawn sprinkler systems or in-ground swimming pools will soon be receiving letters from the Backflow Prevention Division of the Kansas City Water Services Department.

These letters will notify residents that all lawn sprinkler systems and in-ground pools are required to have a backflow prevention assembly, and to have it inspected annually by a blackflow prevention tester who has been certified by the Missouri Department of Natural Resources.

This test is required by a 1998 city ordinance.

Those not receiving a letter can call the backflow prevention unit at

513-1313 to request an inspection form, or download it at www.kcmo.org/water (click on Information Links then Backflow Prevention then Backflow Resource Center).

On completion of a test showing that the assembly is performing satisfactorily, the certified tester is to complete a test and maintenance report form and forward it to the backflow prevention unit. The letter gives a deadline for this report. If the unit fails the test, the resident will need to make appropriate repairs and have the assembly retested and certified. If a homeowner fails to meet these obligations, water service to the property may be discontinued.

The purpose of the program is to ensure the quality of safe drinking water in the city.


enjoy, and a venue for hosting certain special events. At times it seems the wheels of progress move slowly, but the important thing is that they are now moving.





Postage: Covers costs of all mailings of bills and newsletters. **Social activities:** Covers costs of special events held throughout


the year.




islands. Includes lights, fountain pumps, and sprinkler system.

Red Light Camera Operating at 79th & Wornall Intersection

The City of Kansas City, Missouri has extended its red light camera program to the intersection at 79th and Wornall Road. Red light cameras are also presently in effect at the intersections of 39th and 27th and Southwest Trafficway, 63rd and Prospect, 39th and Main, and 19th and Walnut Streets.

A violation occurs when a motorist enters an intersection after the light has turned red. The camera records the license plate of the offending driver, who is automatically sent a ticket. The fine is \$100 per violation

The program is intended to encourage safe driving, and is funded entirely by the fines collected. Any

additional revenue generated is to go towards city services.

City transportation engineers selected the targeted intersections as being the most likely to have an immediate impact in reducing accidents. Eventually the City hopes to reduce intersection accidents by 40% through this program.

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Safe and Secure

With warmer weather coming I wanted to talk about summer project safety. I know you are looking forward to working on all your summertime projects. As a safety professional I work every day with hazards that require protective equipment, and those hazards exist when working on home improvement projects as well as on a construction site.

Whether working in the yard or doing repair work there are a few simple items to keep handy that can help you to protect yourself. Protective equipment like safety glasses, earplugs and gloves are a really good start. These items are important when working with lawn equipment and most power tools.

Yard work like mowing and trimming is no day at the beach, so why dress like it? Crocs, flip-flops and shorts provide no protection from flying debris so consider long pants and durable boots (steel toes are best). Remember it is important to keep kids and pets out of the area when using this equipment!

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

Native plants have deep roots that increase water infil-

tration in the soil. Rain gardens collect excess storm water and help prevent overflows of city storm water/sewer systems. Sustainable gardens also attract butterflies, hummingbirds, and produce unique beauty.

The winner of the 2009 Dreamscape Makeover will work with Michael Ashley & Associates to create a custom landscape design for the owner's property. Materials and installation are contributed by GKCB partners Audrie Seeley & Co., Prairie and Wetland Center, Family Tree Nursery, Missouri Organic, House of Rocks and AGrand Ecofertilization.

The receptacles were placed strategically on the north, south, east, and west ends of the neighborhood. Future plans are to blend some receptacles with landscaping.

There were some problems initially with keeping the receptacles emptied, but our garden island contractor, Rosehill Nurseries, has resolved the problem and will strive to keep the receptacles serviced regularly.

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The trash receptacles are for light trash only. The Armour Fields board asks you to limit the amount of doggie-doo being deposited and to seal or tie any plastic bags holding the deposits. Also, please keep them free of regular household trash; these are for general neighborhood use only.

With regular service and limiting the doggie-doo, the trash receptacles should have no odor or rodent issues as concerns have been voiced by some.

The amount of trash already collected shows that the receptacles are a much needed addition in efforts to beautify the neighborhood and keep our environment green. Thank for helping!
