UPCOMING ANNUAL MEETING AND ELECTIONS

This year's annual meeting for the Armour Fields Homes Association will be held on June 10, 2012. The purpose of the annual meeting is to hold annual elections and to bring together members of the association.

Annual Election: This year, members will vote for three directors, each to serve a two-year term. In addition, members will elect a president and treasurer, the officers of the board of directors. The president and treasurer must be one of the nine members elected to the board of directors.

Voting Requirements: Only members in good standing can vote at the annual meeting. To be in good standing, members must have paid all dues in full. The voting rights of members

PRESIDENT'S COLUMN

I was trying to think of what to write for this column and I decided to address some things that have been weighing on my mind. It is my hope that all residents will humor me and accept my candor.

As always spring is a busy time here in the Armour Fields
Homes Association. Neighbors are out working on their lawns and landscapes, planting, seeding and maintaining. These improvements and maintenance projects are an important part of home ownership that is critical to protecting and growing your investment. Your homes

association is in place to protect your investment by ensuring that public areas are maintained and residents



have the services they need to maintain their investment. As the city continues to cut budgets, services will go away or be reduced. For example, it is looking like there will be no funds for leaf pick-ups next year. Our association started a

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new bi-annual event last year for a neighborhood yard waste drop-off which has been very successful and is a very minimal expense to our neighborhood. It's even more important now if the city decides to discontinue their service.

Over the years I have heard some residents complaining about the amount of money the association takes in and how much is spent. I want to take this chance to add perspective. When our association was created, it provided nearly every service, including all the maintenance we do now and more: trash pickup and clearing snow from the streets and even the sidewalks. In the early years events were opulent affairs at places like the Alameda Plaza. You may ask how they paid for all that with the dues at an average of \$24 per home. The answer is simple: adjusted for inflation that rate today would be worth \$310 per home! Your dues today, when adjusted for inflation are only 29% of what a homeowner paid in 1930; when the nonmandatory security assessment is added in, you are only paying 53%. The reality is that depending on participation, and adjusting for inflation, we are all receiving a 50 - 75% discount on our dues.

The role and duty of the AFHA board is to maintain and improve this association in a responsible and transparent way. That includes not just maintaining physical assets like the fountains and islands but also the sense of community that makes our neighborhood great. In the nearly 6 years that I have served this association I have been proud to work with the volunteers who work diligently to accomplish those goals, receiving no compensation for their efforts. The parks and islands have never looked better. Also, our events have grown, with more neighbors getting together to socialize and talk about issues that affect all of us. I personally believe that this is just as important as all of the physical things that we do, because as a result I see more people stepping forward to help their neighbors and build the community that we all love.

The final item I would like to discuss is the perception by some association members that the members of the board receive special privileges; this is absolute nonsense. All board members pay their dues (including the security assessment) and are subject to the same bylaws and city codes as any other members, all while taking their time to work to better this association. Many pay a personal price

when working to fight against the reductions in services that the city government is pushing for; they are castigated, besmirched, attacked by the political elite and called horrible names for standing up for your rights as homeowners. It is not often that those who complain actually come to a board meeting or volunteer their time to make the association better. So prior to passing judgment, I ask that members get involved, show up at a board meeting, review the books, talk to multiple board members, look and listen for yourself.

This will be my last column as President of the Armour Fields Homes Association, as my term is complete in June. I have decided not to run for reelection so I can spend more time with my wife, Karen, and son, Silas. I am truly honored that I have received so much support over the years and intend to continue volunteering my time to the neighborhood that I love. I ask that you come out to the Annual Meeting in June and elect board members who are willing to work hard to maintain and improve our association so we can stay one of the most desirable places to live in Kansas City. ◊

who have not paid their dues will be suspended.

Election Procedures: Voting at the annual meeting is by ballot. To ensure eligibility, members must present a valid ID to vote. <u>Each residence is permitted one vote</u>, no matter how many residents live at an address. Members in good standing can write in additional candidates on the day of the election.

Voting by Proxy: If a member cannot attend the annual meeting, bylaws allow voting by proxy. To vote by proxy, a member must submit a signed, addressed proxy to another AFHA member, who must then surrender it to vote on the absent resident's behalf. Go to www.ha-kc.org for complete bylaws and details.

Suspension of Voting Rights: Voting rights of members who have not paid all dues owed will be suspended.

Requirements for Candidates:

Members who want to run for one of the officer positions must be in good standing. To be a candidate, you must notify the association president by Friday, June 8th. See the back of the newsletter for contact information. ◊

Three hundred and fifty eggs were filled by Special Events Co-Chairs Shelley Cetin and Sarah Hancock and much appreciated volunteer Gail Claire. Volunteers scurried about the island trying to hide the eggs, but good hiding places were in short supply.

Board member Hank VanArsdale and his granddaughter Mary Claire Dunagan were among the egg hiders. When Mary Claire heard that we were short an Easter bunny, she quickly offered to dress up in the furry white rabbit costume and greet the kids. She was the cutest Easter bunny that Armour Fields has ever had, and her friendly nature and beautiful smile helped make it a very fun event. Thank you Mary Claire!

A large group of neighborhood kids were eager to get started and once the hunt was underway, it was over in less than ten minutes. One unfortunate group showed up late and were disappointed to find all 350 eggs had been snatched up. The city of Kansas City, Missouri subsidized the significant cost of the three dumpsters, which each cost \$55, for a total cost of \$165. For our association and its 788 homes, this is an incredible value. It means a cost of less than 21 cents per household! Much cheaper than paying a service to pick up lawn debris. As at the fall event, the dumpsters were nearly full by noon, when their doors were locked.

Our next event is the June 10th Annual Meeting. We hope to see you there!

MONEY MATTERS: Happy Fiscal New Year!

March 31, 2012 marks the end of the Armour Fields Homes Association (AFHA) 2012 fiscal year. The volunteer Board was hard at work this year using the mandatory base assessment (\$90) and optional security fees (\$75). In general, the base assessment is used to maintain the association's parks, islands, and fountains; social events such as our Annual Meeting, Easter Egg hunt and Oktoberfest; the Armour Star; and administrative fees. The security fee pays for all safety and security-related matters, such as contracting a private plow service to clear the association streets in the winter to enable emergency services (police or fire) to better service our members

and Chesley Brown security service, which patrols our neighborhood, checks in on vacationing members' homes and responds to all emergency calls in our neighborhood.

A summary of FY 2012

Revenues: AFHA billed a total of \$130,350 to its members. This is comprised of \$71,100 and \$59,250 for base assessment and security fees, respectively. Total revenues for 2012 and 2011 were \$114,167 and \$113,326, respectively. Revenues for base assessment and security fees for 2012 and 2011 were \$112,202 and \$109,474, respectively. An increase of \$2,728 was primarily due to

more members paying the optional security fee. In 2012, 70% of the membership paid the security fees, which resulted in a collection of\$41,267. In 2011 66% of the membership paid the security fees, which resulted in a collection of \$38,374. At year end \$16,232 in base assessment fees was uncollected and comprised 38 members. Approximately 37% the uncollected balance is encumbered by liens.

Expenses: The 2012 budgeted expenses were \$129,340. Actual expenses were \$110,567, resulting in a surplus of \$3,600.

The surplus resulted primarily from a reduction in \$3,200 in administrative expenses from moving to a new billing cycle.

A savings of \$3,700 in fountain maintenance is due to the many volunteer hours contributed by Hank Van Arsdale and Ron McMickle and a final savings of \$5,000 in Parks & Island Maintenance is due to the bid work and numerous hours donated by Jane Aylward.

Fiscal year 2012 Budget Summary

Revenues = \$115,000 **Expenses** = 122,420 **Budget deficit** = \$7,420. The deficit is attributable to Deferred Maintenance work to be performed and improvements to our Parks and Islands.



Parks & Islands

In the past year, we have been busy implementing plans the P&I committee devised in 2010. Here's what has happened:

Seville Park The 3 remaining

stone columns and bench were relocated for symmetry and boxwoods and pink Knock-Out roses recently planted around them. The tall evergreens are being relocated and replaced with a different variety and more boxwood planted around the stone marker. Hank VanArsdale repainted the Seville Park sign. Cherub Park Boxwood were added behind the dancing cherubs and white Cherokee Chief dogwood trees planted to bloom in the spring and have red berries and bronze foliage in the fall. Next year, we can add pink dogwood or redbud trees at the east end for contrast. Redbud trees bloom earlier than

65th & Valley We added yellow Knock-Out roses around the statue here, yellow because the flowers are visible at night. Thorns were added to deter vandals.

dogwoods and are great climbing

trees for the kids.

68th & Wornall The little dogwood has really grown! Thank you to all the neighbors who hauled water last year. This year, we will neaten the border with more liriope, replace the boxwood if they don't green up soon, and fill in with begonias.

Ward Parkway Park The stone marker has been moved to the east in front of the utility boxes and installed with footings and piers. It was a delicate procedure because that stone plaque is only 1" thick, not the usual 2 ½-3" for

a plaque that size. The center ring of boxwood around the urn was moved to the front of this wall, and blush Knockout roses added on each end. I have started red/green caladium bulbs in pots in my kitchen; they will be added when the soil warms up. We used a darker, denser version of box around the urn pedestal, will trim the outer box to form a beaded necklace and then add Plum Pudding heucheras and mondo grass for texture. It would be great to have volunteers to help paint the utility boxes so they blend in better.

Hicks yews were added as a backdrop for the statues; oak leaf hydrangeas, which grow to about 6' x 6', were planted on either side. They are so talented! Their flowers are cream and blush in the beginning of the season and darken to a rose. The leaves darken from green to bronze in the fall. The best thing we have done all year is add the lighting around the urn, statues and sign. The cedar trunks behind the statues are now visible at night.

This year we will delineate the beds, mulch, level up the lawn, seed and pray for rain. We have to haul water to this park, so we depend upon a higher power to grow grass. We have water, but need to install a meter and hydrant. As funds become available, we will add more shade trees and benches like the ones at Romanelli Park. ◊

SAFE AND SECURE

It is that season again, the time when the door-to-door sales people get out and start pedaling their wares. All too often, though, these sales people are not legitimate or are willing to lie and cheat you out of your money. Among the most nefarious are the unscrupulous companies that employ young people, often bringing them in from out of state, to sell magazines.

The companies set the young employees up with elaborate back stories to gain your confidence. As they move through the area, they improvise. One recent "sales person" claimed to be the son of the "retired Marine veteran" on the next block over doing a fundraiser for school. This attempt to play on your emotions is designed to cater to your desire to help your neighbors, or a veteran, and make you feel guilty that you don't know your neighbors better. They do their homework, often researching local schools and claiming to be students there. They give you a local address, maybe the name of a neighbor that they already scammed! As Steve Martin said in the movie Leap of Faith. "The mark of a good con is in the details."

Many people wanting to help are scammed. So how can you protect yourself from these crooks? Here are some tips that I have put together with the help of AFHA resident and board member Rodd Staker:

- Only participate in fundraisers with people you know. If the fundraisers are young people, check their story, ask for their parents' address and phone, then call them.
- Ask for their city business license. If they do not have one, they are not legitimately selling. And don't believe the I-left-it-in-my-car line.
- If you don't know the person or the organization, don't give; politely decline.

- Get more detail from the solicitor and call the organization or contact person to inquire prior to giving.
- Ask your neighbors on your block about the solicitor or organization before giving.
- The best bet is not to open the door.
- Any time that you may be suspicious of the person soliciting, please call the Police or Chesley Brown security at 816-753-2945 or 816-753-2946.

Finally, I would like to take this opportunity to thank the newest member of the Safety & Security Committee, Ron McMickle.

Ron has been a great volunteer for our association, helping to maintain the Romanelli Fountain, helping neighbors with chores, working to improve safety on the streets, recruiting others to help and more. If you see Ron, make sure you thank him for his great volunteerism! \Diamond
